Harm reduction is a philosophy that supports drug policies based on science, compassion, health and human rights. It uses pragmatic strategies that meet drug users “where they’re at” and all positive changes, even incremental ones. Harm reduction supports safer use of drugs — syringe programs, safe consumption sites and methadone, for example — and empowering people to live happy, healthy lives.

We believe in treating all people, including drug users, with respect and without stigma.

Naloxone/Narcan

Naloxone is a medication designed to rapidly reverse opioid overdose. ... It can very quickly restore normal respiration to a person whose breathing has slowed or stopped as a result of overdosing with heroin or prescription opioid pain medications.

Naloxone is a prescription drug. You can buy it in many pharmacies, in some cases without bringing a prescription. CVS and Walgreens have it available in Washington Court House. This way, it costs between \$90-\$110 for 2 doses.

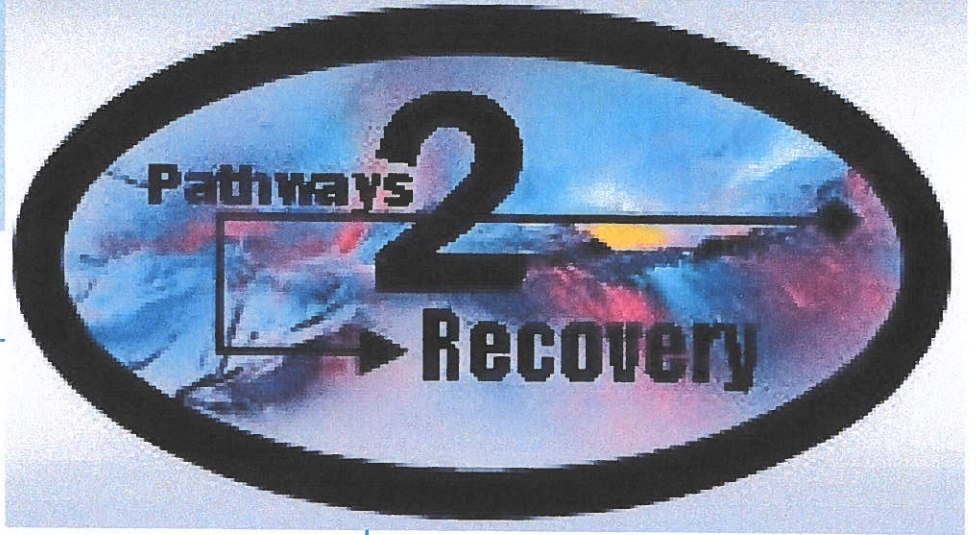

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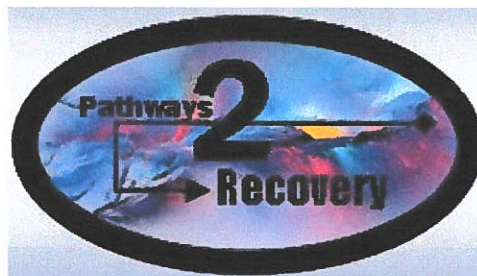

Community Action Announces Pathways to Recovery Program

For much of the past century, scientist studying substance misuse labored in the shadows of powerful myths and misconceptions about the nature of addiction. When scientist began to study addictive behavior in the 1930's, people suffering from addictions were thought to be morally flawed and lacking in willpower. Those views shaped society's responses to substance misuse, treating it as a moral failing rather than a health problem, which led to an emphasis on punishment rather than prevention and treatment.

We know that addiction is a disease that affects both the behavior. With this understanding, the Faith in Recovery Coalition was formed in 2014 with the mission to combat substance abuse in Fayette County through collaborative community development project to promote a safer, healthier community. Projects created through this collaborative include the Drug Free Communities Program, Recovery Housing, and the Rural Health Opioid Program.

Funded by the Health Resources and Services Administration, Fayette County will launch this program on March 6, 2019, under the project name Pathways to Recovery. This program is based upon the philosophy that there are multiple pathways to recovery, people can and do recover, and that peer support and care coordination are essential to preventing the senseless number of lives we have lost in the past few years. The program will operate from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. 7 days a week. Our Peer Recovery Specialists will respond with other emergency service personnel to overdoses and other community referrals. They will pass out hope packets, offering individuals connections to treatment, applications for medical benefits, and other essential services.

The program will not stop there. They will follow the individual as they transfer to or from programs and/or incarceration. These are times when they are most vulnerable to overdose deaths. They will continue to connect them to community resources (Medicaid, SNAP benefits) and employment when appropriate. They will also connect them to transportation either through grant funding through Fayette County Transportation or through the Volunteer Driver Program.

The Peer Recovery Specialists will also work with family members to provide education on self-care, supporting their loved ones during treatment and setting up emotional supports and boundaries.

Types of Treatment Programs

Research studies on addiction treatment typically have classified programs into several general types or modalities. Treatment approaches and individual programs continue to evolve and diversify, and many programs today do not fit neatly into traditional drug addiction treatment classifications.

Most, however, start with detoxification and medically managed withdrawal, often considered the first stage of treatment. Detoxification, the process by which the body clears itself of drugs, is designed to manage the acute and potentially dangerous physiological effects of stopping drug use. As stated previously, detoxification alone does not address the psychological, social, and behavioral problems associated with addiction and therefore does not typically produce lasting behavioral changes necessary for recovery. Detoxification should thus be followed by a formal assessment and referral to drug addiction treatment.

Because it is often accompanied by unpleasant and potentially fatal side effects stemming from withdrawal, detoxification is often managed with medications administered by a physician in an inpatient or outpatient setting; therefore, it is referred to as "medically managed withdrawal." Medications are available to assist in the withdrawal from opioids, benzodiazepines, alcohol, nicotine, barbiturates, and other sedatives.

Long-Term Residential Treatment

Long-term residential treatment provides care 24 hours a day, generally in non-hospital settings. The best-known residential treatment model is the therapeutic community (TC), with planned lengths of stay of between 6 and 12 months. TCs focus on the "resocialization" of the individual and use the program's entire community—including other residents, staff, and the social context—as active components of treatment. Addiction is viewed in the context of an individual's social and psychological deficits, and treatment focuses on developing personal accountability and responsibility as well as socially productive lives. Treatment is highly structured and can be confrontational at times, with activities designed to help residents examine damaging beliefs, self-concepts, and destructive patterns of behavior and adopt new, more harmonious and constructive ways to interact with others. Many TCs offer comprehensive services, which can include employment training and other support services, onsite.

Short-Term Residential Treatment

Short-term residential programs provide intensive but relatively brief treatment based on a modified 12-step approach. These programs were originally designed to treat alcohol problems, but during the cocaine epidemic of the mid-1980s, many began to treat other types of substance use disorders. The original residential treatment model consisted of a 3- to 6-week hospital-based inpatient treatment phase followed by extended outpatient therapy and participation in a self-help group, such as AA. Following stays in residential treatment programs, it is important for individuals to remain engaged in outpatient treatment programs and/or aftercare programs. These programs help to reduce the risk of relapse once a patient leaves the residential setting.

Outpatient Treatment Programs

Outpatient treatment varies in the types and intensity of services offered. Such treatment costs less than residential or inpatient treatment and often is more suitable for people with jobs or extensive social supports. It should be noted, however, that low-intensity programs may offer little more than drug education. Other outpatient models, such as intensive day treatment, can be comparable to residential programs in services and effectiveness, depending on the individual patient's characteristics and needs. In many outpatient programs, group counseling can be a major component. Some outpatient programs are also designed to treat patients with medical or other mental health problems in addition to their drug disorders.

Individualized Drug Counseling

Individualized drug counseling not only focuses on reducing or stopping illicit drug or alcohol use; it also addresses related areas of impaired functioning—such as employment status, illegal activity, and family/social relations—as well as the content and structure of the patient's recovery program. Through its emphasis on short-term behavioral goals, individualized counseling helps the patient develop coping strategies and tools to abstain from drug use and maintain abstinence. The addiction counselor encourages 12-step participation (at least one or two times per week) and makes referrals for needed supplemental medical, psychiatric, employment, and other services.

Group Counseling

Many therapeutic settings use group therapy to capitalize on the social reinforcement offered by peer discussion and to help promote drug-free lifestyles. Research has shown that when group therapy either is offered in conjunction with individualized drug counseling or is formatted to reflect the principles of cognitive-behavioral therapy or contingency management, positive outcomes are achieved. Currently,

researchers are testing conditions in which group therapy can be standardized and made more community-friendly.

Methadone

Methadone is a long-acting synthetic opioid agonist medication that can prevent withdrawal symptoms and reduce craving in opioid-addicted individuals. It can also block the effects of illicit opioids. It has a long history of use in treatment of opioid dependence in adults and is taken orally. Methadone maintenance treatment is available in all but three States through specially licensed opioid treatment programs or methadone maintenance programs.

Combined with behavioral treatment: Research has shown that methadone maintenance is more effective when it includes individual and/or group counseling, with even better outcomes when patients are provided with, or referred to, other needed medical/psychiatric, psychological, and social services (e.g., employment or family services).

Buprenorphine

Buprenorphine is a synthetic opioid medication that acts as a partial agonist at opioid receptors—it does not produce the euphoria and sedation caused by heroin or other opioids but is able to reduce or eliminate withdrawal symptoms associated with opioid dependence and carries a low risk of overdose.

Buprenorphine is currently available in two formulations that are taken sublingually: (1) a pure form of the drug and (2) a more commonly prescribed formulation called Suboxone, which combines buprenorphine with the drug naloxone, an antagonist (or blocker) at opioid receptors. Naloxone has no effect when Suboxone is taken as prescribed, but if an addicted individual attempts to inject Suboxone, the naloxone will produce severe withdrawal symptoms. Thus, this formulation lessens the likelihood that the drug will be abused or diverted to others.

Buprenorphine treatment for detoxification and/or maintenance can be provided in office-based settings by qualified physicians who have received a waiver from the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), allowing them to prescribe it. The availability of office-based treatment for opioid addiction is a cost-effective approach that increases the reach of treatment and the options available to patients.

Buprenorphine is also available as in an implant and injection. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved a 6-month subdermal buprenorphine implant in May 2016 and [a once-monthly buprenorphine injection in November 2017](#).

Treatment, not Substitution

Because methadone and buprenorphine are themselves opioids, some people view these treatments for opioid dependence as just substitutions of one addictive drug for another (see [Question 19](#)). But taking these medications as prescribed allows patients to hold jobs, avoid street crime and violence, and reduce their exposure to HIV by stopping or decreasing injection drug use and drug-related high-risk sexual behavior. Patients stabilized on these medications can also engage more readily in counseling and other behavioral interventions essential to recovery.

Naltrexone

Naltrexone is a synthetic opioid antagonist—it blocks opioids from binding to their receptors and thereby prevents their euphoric and other effects. It has been used for many years to reverse opioid overdose and is also approved for treating opioid addiction. The theory behind this treatment is that the repeated absence of the desired effects and the perceived futility of abusing opioids will gradually diminish craving and addiction. Naltrexone itself has no subjective effects following detoxification (that is, a person does not perceive any particular drug effect), it has no potential for abuse, and it is not addictive.

Naltrexone as a treatment for opioid addiction is usually prescribed in outpatient medical settings, although the treatment should begin after medical detoxification in a residential setting in order to prevent withdrawal symptoms.

Naltrexone must be taken orally—either daily or three times a week—but noncompliance with treatment is a common problem. Many experienced clinicians have found naltrexone best suited for highly motivated, recently detoxified patients who desire total abstinence because of external circumstances—for instance, professionals or parolees. Recently, a long-acting injectable version of naltrexone, called Vivitrol, was approved to treat opioid addiction. Because it only needs to be delivered once a month, this version of the drug can facilitate compliance and offers an alternative for those who do not wish to be placed on agonist/partial agonist medications.

Comparing Buprenorphine and Naltrexone

A NIDA study comparing the effectiveness of a buprenorphine/naloxone combination and an extended release naltrexone formulation on treating opioid use disorder has found that both medications are similarly effective in treating opioid use disorder once treatment is initiated. Because naltrexone requires full detoxification, initiating treatment among active opioid users was more difficult with this medication. However, once detoxification was complete, the naltrexone formulation had a similar effectiveness as the buprenorphine/naloxone combination.

Fayette County Treatment Programs

Outpatient Treatment Services

According to the Addiction Center, Outpatient drug rehab is less restrictive than inpatient programs. Outpatient recovery programs usually require 10 to 12 hours a week spent visiting a local treatment center.

These sessions focus on drug abuse education, individual and group counseling, and teaching addicted people how to cope without their drug. Outpatient drug rehab can be a good standalone option for someone with a mild addiction, or it can be part of a long-term treatment program.

Outpatient drug rehab can last three to six months — something similar to inpatient treatment — or over a year.

Inpatient Treatment Services

According to the Addiction Center, inpatient recovery programs require patients to check themselves into a controlled environment to overcome their addictions. Patients stay at a clinic with 24-hour medical and emotional support. Some inpatient treatment center require that individuals are detoxed before entry into the program.

Successful inpatient clinics know family involvement is crucial to recovery. Family members can contact loved ones in residential treatment to provide emotional support and encouragement. When it comes to how and how often residents can communicate with their loved ones, each inpatient center's policy is different. Some rehab centers also provide counseling for the addicted person's family.

During inpatient treatment, residents are able to completely focus on getting well and sober without the distractions of everyday life. A typical day in residential treatment is carefully scheduled and accounted for. Psychologists, counselors and psychiatrists meet with patients individually and in group settings to guide inpatient recovery.

A typical inpatient program runs anywhere from 28 days to six months.

Detox Services

The first step in inpatient treatment is medically assisted detox. Physicians and addiction specialists monitor patients' vital signs while the drugs exit the system. Drug cravings are common during detox and can be difficult to overcome, often leading to relapse. Constant medical care provided during detox treatment helps guard against relapse. Clinicians can provide necessary medicine and medical expertise to lessen cravings and withdrawals.

The brain reacts differently to different addictive substances over time and frequent use. Withdrawal symptoms aren't pleasant for any drug, but some drugs should never be quit without medical supervision. Some withdrawals can be fatal. Lethal withdrawals are linked to drugs like synthetic opiates, benzodiazepines, alcohol and heroin. During detox-inpatient rehab patients have access to 24-hour medical attention. This attention can mean the difference between relapse and recovery.

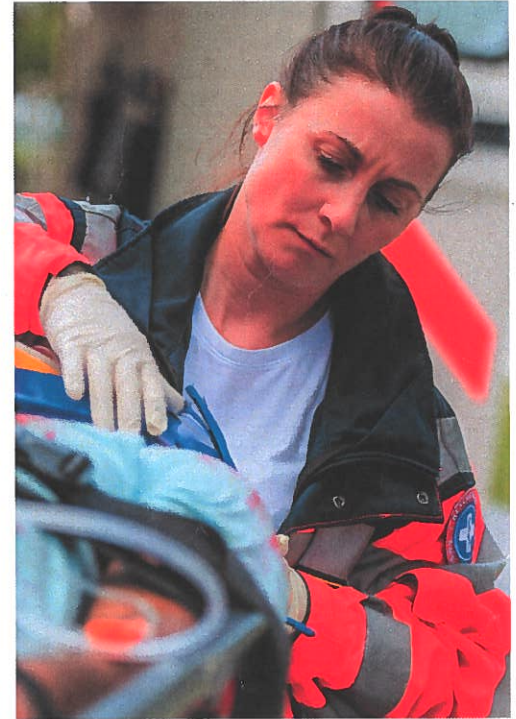
SAMHSA developed the Opioid Overdose Prevention Toolkit to address the frequency and impact of opioid overdoses. Medical personnel, healthcare professionals, people who use drugs, and other community members who may witness and respond to an overdose can make a major contribution toward reducing the toll of opioid overdose by being trained in opioid prevention strategies and the use of the opioid antagonist medication naloxone. Naloxone is the treatment of choice to reverse the potentially fatal respiratory depression caused by opioid overdose.

ABOUT THE TOOLKIT

The Toolkit updates strategies for community members to prevent overdose deaths, recommends steps for first responders to reduce the number of deaths resulting from opioid overdoses and discusses ways healthcare providers can contribute to reducing the effects of opioid overdose. The Toolkit discusses risk reduction strategies and treatment for people who have experienced an opioid overdoses. The toolkit also includes information patients and family members can use to improve safety at home by preventing, identifying and reacting to opioid overdose.

PREVENTING AN OPIOID OVERDOSE

Signs and Symptoms of an Opioid Overdose

During an overdose, breathing can be dangerously slowed or stopped, causing brain damage or death. It's important to recognize the signs and act fast. Signs include:

- Small, constricted "pinpoint pupils"
- Falling asleep or loss of consciousness
- Slow, shallow breathing
- Choking or gurgling sounds
- Limp body
- Pale, blue, or cold skin



What To Do If You Think Someone Is Overdosing

It may be hard to tell if a person is high or experiencing an overdose. If you aren't sure, it's best to treat it like an overdose— you could save a life.

- ① Call 911 immediately.
- ② Administer naloxone, if available.
- ③ Try to keep the person awake and breathing.
- ④ Lay the person on their side to prevent choking.
- ⑤ Stay with him or her until emergency workers arrive.

Ask your doctor about naloxone - a safe medication that can quickly stop an opioid overdose. It can be injected into the muscle or sprayed into the nose to rapidly block the effects of the opioid on the body.

Opioid Overdose Basics

Prescription opioids (like hydrocodone, oxycodone, and morphine) and illicit opioids (like heroin and illegally made fentanyl) are powerful drugs that have a risk of a potentially fatal overdose. Anyone who uses opioids can experience an overdose, but certain factors may increase risk including but not limited to:



- Combining opioids with alcohol or certain other drugs
- Taking high daily dosages of prescription opioids
- Taking more opioids than prescribed
- Taking illicit or illegal opioids, like heroin or illicitly-manufactured fentanyl, that could possibly contain unknown or harmful substances
- Certain medical conditions, such as sleep apnea, or reduced kidney or liver function
- Age greater than 65 years old

Death from an opioid overdose happens when too much of the drug overwhelms the brain and interrupts the body's natural drive to breathe.

Community Action Commission of Fayette County Programs

Youth Programs

Early Head Start – program for infants, toddlers and pregnant women to help parents use their home environment to provide rich learning opportunities and enhance their child’s development. Serves youth ages 0 – 3. Services include: home visits, parenting skills, promoting sound, physical social and emotional growth, information on development and nutrition, pre-school preparation, identifying developmental delays and access to dental appointment and transitions to pre-school.

Head Start – free preschool program for youth ages 3-5. Head Start provides breakfast, lunch and a snack. Children receive developmental, speech, vision, and hearing screenings onsite. We serve all eligible children, including children with disabilities. We provide transportation to both site locations.

Drug Free Communities Program – youth substance abuse prevention program working to do decrease youth substance use utilizing a comprehensive set of strategies to address both individual and environmental change in the community. DFC staff conduct SBIRT (Screening, Brief Intervention and Referrals to Treatment) for youth that are suspected of having a substance use issue. Parent education is available on how to talk to your kids about substance use. Staff also run youth drug-free coalitions at both local school districts. Youth led programming employs education, alternative activities and community service projects targeted to use positive peer pressure to delay 1st use of substances. The program also offers community education and other early intervention programs in conjunction with local partners.

National Family Caregiver Program - The Caregiver Program offers one time assistance with Respite Care and supplemental services such as purchasing medication, house and rent payments, utility bills, food and medical equipment, and much more depending on the applicant’s needs. This Title III funded program provides support services to persons who are acting in a caregiver capacity to a person age 60 or over. Support services include respite care for the caregiver, emergency payments for the client or the caregiver and linkage to other needed services. Caregivers or Care recipients must be Seniors ages 60 and over and must reside in Fayette County.

Homemaker Aide Program - An aide goes to the homes of persons age 60 or over who are unable to do their own housework and provides homemaker services. Services include vacuuming, dusting, cleaning bathrooms, washing dishes, mopping floors, laundry and shopping.

Healthy U Chronic Disease Self-Management Program - Healthy U is a FREE six-session workshop that can help people with diabetes, asthma, arthritis, heart disease and other lifelong conditions set goals and make a step-by-step plan to improve their life. This workshop can also be taken by those who do not have a chronic condition but are wanting to find ways to help a friend or family member to better self-manage their chronic condition.

Matter of Balance – This is a free workshop designed to reduce falling and increase activity of older adults that are concerned about falling.

Homeless Programs – All of Community Action’s Homeless Programs provide case management, housing placement, action planning and referrals based upon the housing first philosophies.

Emergency Shelter – The Brick House Homeless Shelter is a 16-bed facility targeted to victims of domestic violence, families with children, and single women.

Rapid Re-Housing (RRH) – RRH is a homeless program that provides financial assistance and case management to individuals and families that are homeless on the streets or have been in shelter for 5 or more days. Income must be no greater than 50% AMI at entry and below 90% AMI for continuation.

Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) – Community Action has 5 different PSH programs. To qualify for PSH a household must have one person that has a disability and the entire household must have an income no greater than 35% AMI. Specific programs have different guidelines. Four of the five programs require that individuals are chronically homeless. This means they have a disabling condition and have been homeless for 12 continuous months for four times in three years where the cumulative time homeless is 12 months. Regardless of program, individuals must go through the coordinated entry and prioritization process. Individuals with the most severe needs and longest homeless history will be served first.

Pathways to Recovery

The purpose of the Pathways to Recovery Program is to reduce the morbidity and mortality related to opioid overdoses in Fayette County, Ohio by strengthening the development of the Faith in Recovery community coalition to prepare individuals with opioid-use disorder (OUD) to start treatment, implement care coordination practices to organize patient care activities, and support individuals in recovery by establishing new peer support activities. The project will also include an educational component to train members of the community and healthcare professionals on OUD, methods for preparing/referring individuals for treatment, and supporting individuals while in recovery. Services: overdose response, harm reduction and naloxone distribution, case management and referrals, care coordination, and transportation coordination.

They also have a general, in-county demand-response transportation programs. Passengers must call ahead to arrange these services. Trips are \$1 within Washington Court House and \$1.50 within Fayette County. Out of county trips cost \$2.50/mile. Last, the agency has fixed route that runs from Community Action, to Aldi, downtown and across town to Ohio Thrift and Seton. Trips cost 50 cents. The route runs from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. For special mobility issues, the agency operates a Mobility Management program.

Utility Programs

Community Action has HEAP (Home Energy Assistance Program), PIPP (Percentage of Income Payment Plan, and the Winter and Summer Crisis programs. Applicants must a gross annual income of 175% FPG. HEAP pays a one-time payment towards heating your home. Summer crisis provides an air conditioner to the elderly and individuals with disabilities that would be improved by having an air conditioner. Winter crisis is for individuals with a disconnect notice or have less than 25% fuel in their tank. PIPP is a program that allows eligible customers to make affordable monthly energy payments on a year-round basis. When a PIPP Plus household pays its monthly PIPP Plus payment on-time and in-full, some of their old debt and the rest of that month's bill goes away in the form of a credit on their utility account. Individuals will pay no more than 12% of their income towards utilities.
